



Throughout the years Americans have realized that the responsibility for the success of the school depends on a good board of education. Petersburg has been especially fortunate in choosing able, conscientious men.

Two of our present board members have served the community for several terms. G. Sam Watkins, a member for the past ten years, has served continuously as president for five years. He has been actively interested in the development of the new unit system. Newman Stevens, secretary of the board, ranks second in length of service.

Foremost among the Board's achievements is the construction of the attractive modern Farm Shop and Industrial Arts Building. By careful planning and thorough study including visits to other schools with similar problems, they have provided a handsome structure with two large shops and two class rooms. More than half the cost was met by the fund realized from the sale of schoolhouses.

During the period of construction, the board continued their interest by closely

supervising the work.

In the entire enterprise the men gave freely of their time and effort. They now have the satisfaction of duty well done.







With a Mexican fiesta Junior-Senior Prom we finished the year.

The last verse of our "School Days" began much as the first had on a bright day in September. Our officers were: President, Orene Arnold; Vice President, Bob Heyen; Secretary, Doris Emmett; Treasurer, Jill Short; Student Council, Denny Harper, Dewey Lynn, Benny Leonard, and Velda Hayden. Able guidance was given by Miss Terry, Miss Masters, Mr. Rasplica, and Mr. Bagby. The year was highlighted by our play, our Prom, the senior trip, and our graduation exercises.

The Commercial Course is one of the most important and practical courses in Petersburg High School. Two years of shorthand, two years of typing and one year of bookkeeping are offered in our high school.

Throughout the course, emphasis is placed on spelling, grammar, and speed and accuracy in skills. One of the main objectives of the training is to prepare students for life in the business world.

One of the opportunities for employment afforded to seniors is through the State Civil Service Examinations. With the state permission this examination is conducted by Mrs. H. P. Satorius of the high school faculty. The test consists of three parts. The first is a two-hour test, evaluating the ability of the student in spelling, grammar, mathematics and office skills. The second part is a test in various typing skills, including work in rough drafts, letters and general typing ability. The third part is a test in shorthand, dictation and transcription rates. If the student passes in each part of the examination, he is called by the State Department for an oral interview. Between thirty-five and forty applicants participated in this examination.

Many employed alumni of our school participated in a second Civil Service Test, conducted at Petersburg High School. It was a state-wide test to improve the ratings for Clerk Stenographers II and III, Clerk Typist II and II and Clerks IV including supervision of departments.

The operetta, "Gentlemen Prefer Seniors," just finished a tour of the United States giving performances in both large and small cities. The boys were taken to Sponsler's Hospital where they were expertly treated by Lela Broaddus, head nurse.

The performers then went to Petersburg, Illinois, where they saw Carole Hubbartt still around, for she hadn't yet decided whether to go to Florida or to stay and "Bob" around Petersburg. They saw Thelma Snyder, foreman of "Snyder's Safe-way Saw-mill." Thelma is so interested in her work that she even sawed logs in her sleep. They gained much information of old classmates who have left home. They learned that LaVerne Weidhuner is now flying one of the Army's new "D. D. Baum"-er planes over Korea. Orene Arnold is running a home for retired Airmen in which a group of redheaded flyer is under Orene's direction. Doris Emmett was still at Petersburg, where every morning she is up early, furiously frying Bacon.

The schedule then took the troupe to Chicago where we found some more old friends. Gene Balster, television star and high flyer extra-ordinary, was making an appearance at the Chicago theater. He had just flown in from Hollywood in his new jet plane. JoAnn Lewis and Connie Miller are joint book-keepers at Marshall Field's, which is now being managed by George Wesselman. At the Chicago Art Institute, Hermina Taapken was in charge of the paintings with Grandma Wilson, who turned out to be Clara Lou, her chief artist. The premier of a new movie took place in Chicago. The movie was "Carrot Top; the star, Dennis Harper, the director, Benny Leonard. The troupe also visited the Schafer's Institution where Jill Short holds the position of Dean of Women. Some visited the Bobsie Wobsie College and found Bob Heyen the head of the Department of Agriculture. Bob said that Ruth Behrends had obtained the job of head Home Adviser in Siberia. 




MAGAZINE WINNERS
