In September, 1951, seventy-four starry-eyed freshmen with their heads in the clouds walked through the portals of P.H.H.S. They chose as their space captains-President, Paul Altig; VicePresident, Joe Reynolds: Secretary, Joyce Severns: Treasurer, Dale Snyder; and Student Council representative, Donald Armstrong. The sponsors were Mr. Worthington, Mr. Curry, and Miss Wilder. The brightest spots in their sky of events were Freshman Initiation Day and the freshman party.

On September 2, 1952, sixty-three sophomores ascended the second step of the star-studded stairway. They chose as guiding lights-President, Paul Altig; Vice-President, Ruth Meyer: Secretary, Anita Moss; Treasurer, Dale Snyder: and Student Council

Among outstanding events of the year was the junior play, "Gown of Glory," directed by Mr . McCreight. The climax of all events was the junior-senior prom, "Stars on Parade.'

On returning to take that last step of the stairway, the forty-nine seniors chose Marilee Phelps, President; Joe Reynolds, Vice-President; Lola Nell Lounsberry, Secretary; and Ruth Meyer, Treasurer: Student Council representatives, Lloyd Lounsberry, Paul Altig, Jo Severns, and Bob Tozer. Manning the telescopes to keep an eye on the stars were Miss Terry, Miss Masters, Mr. Bagby, and Mr. Houck. The outstanding accomplishments of the seniors were the production of the senior play and the publication of the "Sphinx." The end of the year provided a dazzling, star lighted, finish for the seniors with the junior-senior prom, senior week, the senior trip, class night, Baccalaureate, and the graduation exercises.

## Civil Service

The Commercial Course is one of the most important and practical courses in Petersburg High School. Two years of shorthand, two years of typing and one year of bookkeeping are offered in our high school.

Throughout the course, emphasis is placed on spelling. grammar, and speed and accuracy in skills. One of the main objectives of the training is to prepare students for life in the business world.

One of the opporturities for employment afforded to seniors is through the State Civil Service Examinations. With the permission of the state this examination is conducted by Mrs. H. P. Satorius of the high school faculty. The tests con-
sists of three parts. The first is a two-hour test, evaluating the ability of the student in spelling, grammar, mathematics and office skills. The second part is a test in various typing skills, including work in rough drafts, letters and general typing ability. The third part is a test in shorthand, dictation and transcription rates. If the student passes in each part of the examination, he is called by the State Department for an oral interview. Twenty-four participated in the examination this year.

A Federal Civil Service test was conducted for high school seniors by a Federal representative from the Springfield Post Office. Mrs. Satorius assisted in conducting this test.
