
Foreword





Senior History

Seventy-five freshmen entered Petersburg Harris High School in September, 1952. Chosen to lead the class were: President, Robert Hendricker; Vice-President, Larry Lynn; Secretary, Stanley Carter; Treasurer, Ada Powell; and Student Council member, Judy Park. The class sponsors were Mrs. Wood, Mr. Curry, and Mr. Worthington. The freshman reception and class party were highlights of the year.

On September 1, 1953, sixty-four sophomores returned to school. The officers chosen were: President, Larry Lynn; Vice-President, James Short; Secretary, Pat Grosboll; Treasurer, Marguerite Matthews. Rosemary Watkins and Leo Stewart were chosen as representatives on the Student Council. Mrs. Peterson, Mr. Harder, and Mr. Hilderbrand were the class sponsors. Under the direction of Mrs. Peterson, the sophomore stunt provided an excellent program for the year.

Fifty-nine juniors returned to the halls of Harris High School on August 30, 1954. They elected to lead the class: President, Pat Grosboll; Vice-President, Larry Lynn; Secretary-Treasurer, Rosemary Watkins. Student Council members were Barbara Greenwald, Roy Fry, and Leo Stewart. Class advisers were Mrs. Satorius, Miss Holloway, Mr. McCreight, and Miss Schaefer. The highlights of this year were the junior class play, "The Hoosier Schoolmaster", under the direction of Mr. McCreight; and the Junior-Senior Prom, "Spring Fantasies", held on May 13, in the Leland Hotel in Springfield.

On a warm August day in 1955, fifty-three students returned for their last year at P. H. H. S. Later Larry Todd transferred from Greenview, bringing the roll to fifty-four. They chose as officers the following: President, Marilyn Peterson; Vice-President, Roy Fry; Secretary, Shirley Monroe; Treasurer, Dolores Schaefer. Elected to represent the class as Student Council members were Larry Lynn, Marguerite Matthews, Leo Stewart, and J. C. Simpson. Able guidance was given the seniors by Miss Terry, Miss Masters, Mr. Bagby, and Mr. Houck. The class presented the senior play and published the "Sphinx". Marking the end of their high school careers, the end of the year soon came, and brought with it the Junior-Senior Prom, the senior trip, senior week, class night, baccalaureate, and graduation exercises.





Junior Class History

On August 31, 1953, sixty-four students started their first year of high school at P. H. H. S. As their President, they elected Ronnie Moss; Vice-President, Charles Jones; Secretary, Loretta Moss; Treasurer, Richard Reynolds; Student Council Representative, Joe Greenwald. Mrs. Wood, Mr. LaHann, and Mr. Worthington served as class sponsors. Freshman initiation was the highlight of the year.

On August 30, 1954, fifty-eight students began their second year of high school. As their President they chose Rollin Rosendahl; Vice-President, Richard Reynolds; Secretary, Margaret Schafer; Treasurer, Virginia Jordan; Student Council Representatives, Ronnie Moss and Joe Greenwald. Their class sponsors were Mrs. Peterson, Mr. McKee, and Mr. Hilderbrand. The class stunt, "Dragnet", directed by Mrs. Peterson, was the main event of the year. Another pleasant occasion was the class party at New Salem State Park.

On August 29, 1955, fifty-eight students again entered the halls of P. H. H. S. as juniors. As their officers they elected: President, Charles Jones; Vice-President, Richard Reynolds; Secretary-Treasurer, Rollin Rosendahl; Student Council Representatives, Ronnie Moss, Chester Stewart and Joe Greenwald. Civil Service

The Commercial Course is one of the most important and practical courses in Petersburg High School. Two years of shorthand, two years of typing and one year of bookkeeping are offered in our high school.

One of the objectives of the department is to prepare students for courses in Accountancy and Business Education, which they will pursue in college.

Another objective is to prepare students for life in the business world. Throughout the course, emphasis is placed on spelling, grammar, and speed and accuracy in skills.

One of the opportunities for employment afforded to seniors is through the State Civil Service Examinations. Mrs. H. P. Satorius of the high school faculty has been appointed as a state monitor. The test consists of three parts. The first is a two-hour test, evaluating the ability of the student in spelling, grammar, mathematics, and office skills. The second part is a test in various typing skills, including work in rough drafts, letters and general typing ability. The third part is a test in shorthand, dictation and transcription rates. If the student passes in each part of the examination, he is called by the State Department for an oral interview. Twenty-two seniors participated in the examination this year.

Many employed alumni of our school participated in a second Civil Service Test. It was a state-wide test to improve the ratings for Clerk Stenographers II and III, Clerk Typists II and III, and Clerks IV including supervision of departments.



It will last longer and give you that carefree look."










Class Prophecy
